The Hero of His Own Story



Two years ago, Jose was a typical 11-year-old boy when his life changed forever. A tragic accident left him with a fractured spine, and he was paralyzed from the waist down. Now reliant on a wheelchair for mobility, Jose and his family faced immense challenges as they navigated their new reality, soon Jose was diagnosed with scoliosis as well, compounding his physical challenges.

The family was referred to the Enhanced Care Management (ECM) program by the Natividad Clinic. They were connected with Marlene, their new Care Manager, and soon the program became essential to Jose and his family, providing vital resources such as food, transportation assistance, and ongoing support. "Coastal Kids Home Care has been so supportive," Jose's mom shared, expressing heartfelt gratitude for Marlene's dedication and care.

Jose makes regular trips to Stanford Children's Hospital for specialized medical care. The long drives from Greenfield to Palo Alto are a testament to the family's resilience. Despite undergoing numerous surgeries, with another scheduled next week, Jose, now 13, remains optimistic. He mentioned being scared to return to school after the accident, but with time and determination, he has adjusted and now looks forward to spending time with his circle of friends every day.

At home, Jose enjoys spending time with his parents and his 6-year-old sister. The family spends their evenings watching movies and playing board games together. Jose also enjoys video games and loves to play Fortnite on his PlayStation 4. While sibling disagreements occasionally arise, these moments are balanced by the joy and connection they share as a family.



His dedicated nursing team, Dillian and Jennifer, provides care for his catheter and dressing changes, while Michelle's massages offer relief and relaxation. Rewriting the Future with Elijah

At just 36 weeks pregnant, Shalray George was rushed into an emergency C-section due to preeclampsia. Her baby boy, Elijah, was born weighing just 4 pounds. From the start, it was clear Elijah faced unique challenges. His small size and difficulty meeting milestones led to months of specialized care in the NICU. At the suggestion of a caring RN student, genetic testing revealed

Elijah's diagnosis: Phelan-McDermid Syndrome, a rare condition requiring lifelong round-the-clock care.

Elijah's diagnosis was a turning point for the family. Shalray, who had just completed graduate school, found herself unable to work due to the demands of his care and the needs of their two older children. The family faced a grieving process, adjusting to a new reality. Yet, their journey has been one of perseverance, love, and unexpected blessings.

Today Elijah is a remarkable 14-year-old who has overcome challenges with great courage. Living with a rare syndrome, he navigates hearing impairments, partial blindness, hormone imbalances, hypotonia (weak muscle tone), and nonverbal autism. Over the years, he has undergone ten surgeries including the placement of a

g-tube to support his nutritional needs. Despite these obstacles, Elijah has infectious laughter and a sweet, affectionate soul. He loves music, BabyFirst TV's Harry the Bunny, and spending time in the water.

In 2024, the family was introduced to Coastal Kids Home Care through the new Enhanced Care Management (ECM) program. Elijah's high level of need led his Care Manager, Calli, to transition him to Coastal Kids comprehensive palliative care program. Six months later, Shalray credits Coastal Kids with being a lifeline. Their Shift RN, Nashia, has become like family, offering excellent care each day. Elijah also benefits from music therapy sessions with Daniel and soothing massages from Michelle, both of which bring him immense joy.

For Elijah's family, time together is precious. They cherish family hikes, beach days, and



life on their small homestead, where they sell eggs, honey, and vinegar at the local farmer's market. Shalray reflects on their journey with gratitude, saying, "I was terrified when we first got his diagnosis, but Elijah has been a blessing. He's enriched our lives in ways we never imagined." Through resilience, community support, faith and love, Elijah and his family continue to embrace life to the fullest, celebrating every small victory. License to Explore



For children with developmental delays, the simple act of moving independently is a milestone that can seem unattainable. Through a remarkable new Coastal Kids Home Care program called GoBabyGo, the dream of movement is becoming a reality. GoBabyGo is a unique initiative in which physical therapists work alongside families to modify mechanical cars, transforming them into accessible vehicles for toddlers with disabilities. The cars are equipped with customized

features like adaptive switches, seats, and safety harnesses that allow children with varying physical abilities to control their movement for the first time. For many kids, the moment they push a button or turn a wheel and begin to move on their own is nothing short of magical.

Since launching the program this spring, Coastal Kids Home Care has provided 13 children with GoBabyGo vehicles. Once in the driver's seat, children with mobility disabilities are given a means to move and a chance to play, explore, and socialize more easily. Instead of being pushed in strollers or carried, these devices give children a sense of control over their own journey. Each vehicle is adapted to the child's unique needs, ensuring a personalized experience. For children like Ellie (pictured above) mobility challenges are no longer an obstacle to exploring the outdoors alongside their loved ones, fostering a sense of togetherness and independence. In 2024, your donation supported these vital programs.

Nurses and therapists traveled more than 188,000 miles to provide in-home medical care to 556 children.

Counselors provided 2232 clinic-based or telehealth sessions for 158 children and youth with mild to moderate mental health needs.

Families caring for children with medical complexity received over 73,500 hours of shift and respite nursing.

Comprehensive palliative care services were available to 133 children with life-limiting illness and 14 families received compassionate end-of-life services for their child.

This year our clinicians distributed holiday gifts valued at nearly \$70,000 benefitting more than 480 families caring for medically fragile children in our community.
